Week 4 Term 2

Dear Parents,

This week, my husband, who clearly has too much time on his hands, has been posting snippets of old family movies on the family *Whatsapp*. What a joy it is to look back at those times and share in the memories of days I can hardly remember. For me, it is a reminder that our children are our most precious gift; new lives grown as a product of an expression of love between two people.

Those years have gone all too quickly; kids grown up and the cycle begins again with the first grandchild. What a great privilege but what an awesome responsibility. People say to me, '*You've got good kids. You're lucky'*. I am sure many of you are told the same. My thoughts are, 'Luck has very little to do with it. It is mostly very hard work and lots of prayers'. I left full time work, teaching a class of 44 students to have my first child followed by three more over the next five year. I soon became acutely aware that teaching a class of 44 12 year old students from 9am to 3.30pm was far easier than one child for twenty four hours a day, the reason being parenting requires being consistent and persistent for the whole time.

When parents offer a 'threat' (for want of a better word) a consequence of misbehaviour, it is vital that they follow through. Be careful of what is threatened. Children quickly learn that 'you don't mean it' (does this mean you cannot be trusted?) and it will take much more effort to rectify the behaviour. I was recently listening to a child psychologist who said that children of parents who don't follow through are less likely to go to them if they need help or something important done for them because the children see them as weak and not reliable. I had never thought of it that way but I can see how that can be.

It is not easy being a good parent but that is the job. Be present and talk to them. Playing a violent computer game in competition with your six or seven year old does not constitute 'being present'. Ask any child and they would rather spend time with their parents - kicking a ball in the back yard, baking cakes, rumbling on the floor – than having some expensive 'thing'. Resist 'spoiling' them for the simple pleasures in life. Having been given too much 'stuff' leaves them bored later as adolescents and then presents the danger of them in search of something 'else' to give them a thrill.

Teachers have consistently expressed their concern over the exposure our students are having to inappropriate programs on the television, on computers and in particular violent games. How can they not become desensitised to the violence and naturally tend to bring it into their play? The other concern is the late bedtime for a lot of our students. According to the Australian Parenting Website, 6-9 year olds need an average of 10-11 hours' sleep a night. It is also important that the period before sleep is calm – reading in bed for 15-20 minutes is perfect.

I am proud to say I have pretty good kids and I and my husband will take a lot of the credit for it, just as I often give credit to many of you. They are not perfect and they certainly weren't always good. My youngest (soon 31 years old) sent us both a text recently thanking us for not giving them everything they wanted and for making them work for what they wanted. He also reminded me of the time, years ago, when we were travelling along the Atherton Tableland, our destination being the mysterious Crystal Caves. After numerous incidents of 'pushing the boundaries', (pretty normal for him) I warned him that there would be no Crystal Caves for him if it continued. Sadly, I had to follow through. We reached Atherton and my other three kids and my friend and her three got to visit the caves but he and I sat. He still remembers the day and the lesson taught. I hope it holds him in good stead when he is a parent himself.

I will climb down from my soap box. Have a lovely weekend with your children – hug them, fly a kite with them (perfect weather for it), pray with them but mostly be really <u>present</u> for them.

The Ascension of the Lord

Sunday May 17th



After Jesus rose from the dead, He "presented Himself alive" to the women near the tomb, to His disciples, and to more than 500 others. In the days following His resurrection, Jesus taught His disciples about the kingdom of God.

Forty days after the resurrection, Jesus and His disciples went to Mount Olivet, near Jerusalem. There, Jesus promised His followers that they would soon receive the Holy Spirit, and He instructed them to remain in Jerusalem until the Spirit had come. Then Jesus blessed them, and as He gave the blessing, He began to ascend into heaven.

It is plain from Scripture that Jesus' ascension was a literal, bodily return to heaven. He rose from the ground gradually and visibly, observed by many intent onlookers. As the disciples strained to catch a last glimpse of Jesus, a cloud hid Him from their view, and two angels appeared and promised Christ's return "in just the same way that you have watched Him go".



Gospel Reflection Mark 16: 15-20

Jesus said to his disciples: "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature. Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved; whoever does not believe will be condemned. These signs will accompany those who believe: in my name they will drive out demons, they will speak new languages. They will pick up serpents with their hands, and if they drink any deadly thing, it will not harm them. They will lay hands on the sick, and they will recover." So then the Lord Jesus, after he spoke to them, was

taken up into heaven and took his seat at the right hand of God. But they went forth and preached everywhere, while the Lord worked with them and confirmed the word through accompanying signs.

It can be very important whom we sit next to. Any family that has tried to sit down to a family dinner or packed the car for a trip has heard children argue at least once about who should sit where. To sit next to someone, especially if that person is important, is to have a place of honour. Jesus has this place of honour seated at God's right hand, but there's more to this metaphor than where Jesus sits in relation to God. To be in the place of honour is also to be in a place of power. Knowing people in powerful places can be helpful. Our children remind us of this each time we are called upon to referee a conflict. Jesus, honoured at God's right hand, is a powerful ally for us.

2015 School Implementation Plan

Each year, all CEDP schools set three goals as part of their year's Implementation Plan. These are informed by data of various sources, from the previous year. In turn, teachers set individual learning goals to develop the skills to assist them to deliver the school goals. Staff development days (pupil free days) are usually a focus of these days. Currently, staff members are focusing on the Literacy Goal and there will be a parent workshop in a couple of weeks on the Literacy block in classrooms-what it means and how you can help your child.

Religious Education: Students develop a deeper knowledge of the Catholic faith through an enriched RE pedagogy demonstrating the 3 levels of understanding.

Literacy: Students will demonstrate three levels of Reading Comprehension and growth reflected in PATR and NAPLAN and improved written responses.

Numeracy: For students to achieve accelerated progress beyond 'on the way' growth point and fewer students vulnerable in multiple domains as reflected in MAI results.

Maths club




<u>Uniform</u>

We have been learning about "Our Living World". We have been exploring the needs of living things and the habitats where they are found.

On Wednesday 13th May we visited the Wildlife Sydney Zoo and the Sea Life Sydney Aquarium. The Wildlife Zoo had exhibits of different habitats found in Australia and the creatures that live in these habitats. The Sea Life Aquarium had exhibits of different freshwater and marine aquatic environments. The students were able to see dugongs, platypuses, sharks and penguins.


