Dear Parents,

What do you want for your child at the end of primary school? I suppose it is safe to say we all want our children to be 'successful'. That raises the question, how is success measured? What does it mean to be successful?

The Oxford Dictionary defines success as 'the accomplishment of an aim or purpose' and further to states, in the traditional sense, that success is 'the attainment of fame, wealth, or social status'.

What do you want for your child at the end of primary school or, in Oxford terms, "what aim or purpose do you want your child to accomplish?"

Our Parent Handbook says that, "at Our Lady of the Angels School, we aim to provide a comprehensive balanced curriculum that engages students in quality learning experiences across the six mandated key learning areas and Religious Education. We endeavour to ensure that each of our students develops a love of learning, a thirst for knowledge, a healthy self-esteem, a respect for others and a desire to know and follow God in building a world of justice and love."

Many years ago I remember my principal saying that a child should leave Primary School with all the skills to hold down a basic job – answer the telephone is a clear and coherent way, write down a message that is legible and concise; serve in a shop accurately negotiating money by calculating cost and change and, above all, have the confidence to do so. Also required are well developed interpersonal skills – appropriate social skills to interact confidently and articulately, as well as the ability to problem solve and think critically. Above all, is to have self-respect and to be resilient, open to learning from mistakes and keep going. Our faith in God and God's plan for us is crucial to this resilience.

I can proudly say that all my children are successful in the 'traditional sense'. In spite of school and any imaginings their parents had for them, they each followed different paths and found their own way. Their family, supportive but not rescuing, and Catholic education provided the foundation for having God and faith ever present. It still is, sometimes more visible than others. I pray every day for their happiness, health and safety; that they are 'good' people and will continue to be. I pray the same for all the students in this school. I pray that my staff members have the means to provide what is needed to deliver the students in their care to the level of this success for which we aim.

Here are just three examples of the <u>many</u> positive letters I have received from parents...

"We have had the most amazing year ever and the kids have all made a wonderful transition. OLA is a great school filled with a lot of love and respect and I still can't believe how family oriented it is and how everything is for the joy of the children."

"Words cannot express how much we love OLA. I am so happy we made the move to come to such an incredible school. The nurturing, guidance, education and pastoral care are amazing."

And the one that sums it up for me...

"My son has had a brilliant experience at OLA and he leaves Year Six as a happy boy with God in his heart. What more could we ask for?"

It's not a coincidence that each of these is from parents who came to OLA from other schools.

Gospel Reflection Mark 12:38-44

In His teaching He said, 'Beware of the scribes who like to walk about in long robes, to be greeted respectfully in the market squares, to take the front seats in the synagogues and the places of honour at banquets; these are the men who devour the property of widows and for show offer long prayers. The more severe will be the sentence they receive.'

He sat down opposite the treasury and watched the people putting money into the treasury, and many of the rich put in a great deal. A poor widow came and put in two small coins, the equivalent of a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, 'In truth I tell you, this poor widow has put more in than all who have contributed to the treasury; for they have all put in money they could spare, but she in her poverty has put in everything she possessed, all she had to live on.'

Reflection

In Mark's Gospel, Jesus once again is teaching His disciples. He warns the disciples about the wrong kind of religion. Jesus is criticising the scribes, who were considered the religious experts at the time about the way they want to be treated and how they treat others. He warns His disciples against three things: the need to have an important status rather than selfless service; the desire for respect and admiration rather than seeking to encourage the goodness of others through modesty and love and not to use the position of power for personal gain. Religion is about our faith and relationship with God. It is following the Commandments, respecting and loving our neighbours. The gifts of joy and love should be treasured and shared with others in need of acceptance, freedom and happiness.

St Pope Leo the Great



Born: Tuscany, Italy

Died: November 10,461 AD, Rome, Italy

November the 10th is the Roman Catholic Church's liturgical memorial of the fifth century Pope, Saint Leo 1st. He was known as 'St Leo the great.'

He was reassigned as Pope on the 29th of September 440 until 461.

He was an Italian aristocrat, and was the first Pope to have been called "the great". His leadership and teachings in the Church made him a Doctor of the Church and earned him the title "Leo the Great".

He taught us that every human being is equal; no one is better than anyone else because Jesus came to save all of us!

He helped lead the early Church closer to Jesus by teaching them about who Jesus really was. He wrote letters to tell us about his life and he wrote many books. He was a good preacher of the Gospel.

Kinder Orientation


