

Dear Parents,

This coming Sunday is the Feast of Corpus Christi – the Body of Christ. This marks the last Sunday of the Liturgical Year, sort of the church's 'new year's eve'. Sunday 20th November 2016: Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe-Year C

Gospel (Lk 23:35-43)

A reading from the holy Gospel according Luke

Lord remember me when you come into your kingdom.

The people stayed there before the cross watching Jesus. As for the leaders, they jeered at him. 'He saved others,' they said, 'let him save

himself if he is the Christ of God, the Chosen One.' The soldiers mocked him too, and when they approached to offer him vinegar they said, 'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself.' Above him there was an inscription: 'This is the King of the Jews.'

One of the criminals hanging there abused him. 'Are you not the Christ?' he said. 'Save yourself and us as well.' But the other spoke up and rebuked him. 'Have you no fear of God at all?' he said. 'You got the same sentence as he did, but in our case we deserved it: we are paying for what we did. But this man has done nothing wrong. Jesus,' he said, 'remember me when you come into your kingdom.' 'Indeed, I promise you,' he replied, 'today you will be with me in paradise.'



What do you know about kings? Kings have power and authority. They live in palaces, with good food, entertainment and servants.

How is this image similar to your idea of who Jesus is? How is this image different? Do you think Jesus made a big deal about being a 'king' when he was hanging out with the Apostles? How do you think he treated them?

Lots of people wonder what INRI stands for. Think of each 'I' as a 'J', and it's easier to see. Jesus of Nazareth, King ('Rex' in Latin) of the Jews. Jesus wasn't in the habit of calling himself King of the Jews.

How do you think he got that title? Who would have most likely seen him as a real king and leader? Why? Who might have used that title only in a mocking way? Why?

If Jesus came today instead of two thousand years ago, do you think modern people would see him as a king? Why or why not?

Do you see Jesus as a king? If not, why not? If so, a king of what? or a king of whom?

Thank you to everyone who responded to our survey on Communication at OLA. These are the findings...

Data snapshot – 113 parents responded

Communication notes (K-4)

- -99% of K-4 parents know the communication sheet are emailed weekly
- -81% always read the communication sheet and 17% sometimes read it
- -11% print the communication sheet
- -It is very important to 75% of respondents that the communication sheet continues in the current format in 2017

Newsletter (K-6)

- -80% always read the newsletter
- -17% usually read the newsletter
- -5% print the newsletter

Skoolbag app (K-6)

-95% of respondents have downloaded the skoolbag app

Blog (5-6)

-26% of 5/6 parents always or usually read the blog

One thing we do very well at OLA is communication. It is what the parents who have come from other schools often say. Those who have always been here know no different. The newsletter is an important communication process. (For the 2% who don't read it, I guess, won't be reading this either.)

In all areas parents responded with suggestions and ideas which will be taken into consideration. We are constantly looking for ways to improve communication – ways that are efficient and effective for you and for us. Whatever we use, it's a two way process so thank you to the vast majority who work with us in the interest of the students, your children.

Vocabulary building tips

Using post-it notes to label household items is a fantastic way to introduce young children to an array of words. This is great for youngsters who are still learning simple words. No matter what age they're at—even if they're not talking yet—children will learn to associate the written word with the item it's attached to. Review each item with your child; pronounce the word and ask them (if old enough) to do the same. Lamps, clocks, beds, and kitchen items such as salt and pepper shakers are all items you can label—though anything in your home that your child interacts with works.
