Sunday, 4th September 2016: Twenty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time-Year C (Luke 14:25-33)



A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

All who do not renounce their possessions cannot be my disciples.

Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them. 'If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.

'And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.'

Gospel Reflection

The wisdom tradition from which the first reading is taken is rooted in the fact that life is a series of choices. The epistle and the gospel reading provide us with examples of the way Christians should choose. Finally, the psalm's description of the fleeting nature of life sets the context and tone of our decision-making.

Discipleship demands that, in the face of all the choices available to us, we keep our priorities straight. In the gospel, Jesus insists that we must be single minded. We must cling to the one thing necessary, and that one thing is authentic discipleship. In choosing Jesus, we choose other things as well. We choose new relationships with the very people to whom we have already been committed. Those who were slaves, or lower class, or employees, or providers of service are now regarded as sisters and brothers in Christ. In choosing Jesus, we also choose the cross. We choose to live in a way that calls us to travel the high road: to forgive offences committed against us; to live simply so that others can simply live; to take responsibility for the moral character of society.

The fleeting nature of life as characterised in the psalm forces us to look at the meaning of life. When the day dawns for us to return to dust, what will we have gained from life? The realisation of our finiteness and the transitory nature of life should help us to set our priorities right and should give us the courage to remain faithful to them. SAINT MOTHER TERESA of KOLKATA

On the 4th September, Pope Francis will declare Blessed Teresa of Kolkata a saint at the Vatican. Mother Teresa was born in Skopje part of the modern-day country of Macedonia. She was originally called Agnes Bojaxhiu. By the age of 18 she was in Ireland where she joined a convent of the Sisters of our Lady Loretto. She changed her name to Mother Teresa. Mother Teresa trained as a teacher and became a principal of a high school in Calcutta in India. While she was there she was horrified seeing so many sick and dying people on the streets. Mother Teresa felt a need to help these people but didn't know what to do. It was in 1946 when Mother Teresa was travelling to Darjeeling by train when she heard the voice of God. She was certain she had heard God's voice and He was calling her to give her a message. God's message she felt was clear and was telling her to leave the convent and help the needy and poor by living among them.

Vocabulary building tips

A rhyming game is always fun, particularly for young children because they can say any “word,” nonsense or sense. Start with things the child knows, such as parts of his body, and say, “I’m thinking of something on your face that rhymes with (sounds like) rose.” From this point, once your child gets the idea, you can play it just by saying words, such as “what’s a word that rhymes with car?” (jar, bar, star, far, et cetera) “How about a word that rhymes with junk?” (bunk, skunk, trunk-but even runk, lunk, zunk as nonsense words). Not only does this quick little game build vocabulary, but it also teaches the child some fine-tuning for the sounds of words.

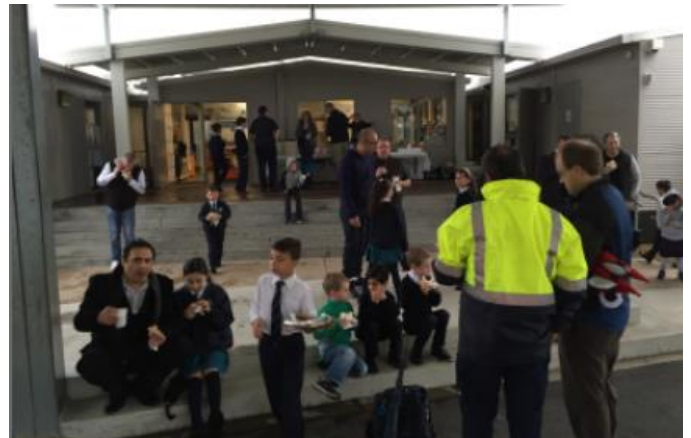
