GOSPEL REFLECTION 'Create in me a clean heart'

Sunday 30th August- Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round him, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, keep the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances, which have been handed down to them to keep, concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So the Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'How rightly Isaiah prophesied about you hypocrites in the passage of scripture: This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me. Their reverence of me is worthless; the lessons they teach are nothing but human commandments. You put aside the commandment of God to observe human traditions.' He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into someone from outside can make that person unclean; it is the things that come out of someone that make that person unclean. For it is from within, from the heart, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, and folly. All these evil things come from within and make a person unclean.'

In Sunday's Gospel, Mark provides detailed information about the Jewish observance of ritual-purity laws. In the scripture passage there is a legal dispute about ritual purity between Jesus, the Pharisees and some of the scribes or teachers of law. Mark addresses the question of which Jewish practices would be observed in the newly emerging Christian community. This question was significant in communities where there were Jewish and Gentile converts to Christianity.

Jesus' first teaching is directed to the Pharisees who questioned him. Jesus' words are then directed to the crowd, teaching that a person is dishonoured by their words and actions, not by the food they eat. In other readings even Jesus' disciples questioned Him for what he had taught. In the Gospels, Jesus' words would challenge the Pharisees, would send a hidden message to the crowd and His words would provide further explanation to His disciples to offer more about His message and meaning.

What does this mean for us? Through The Word we are also challenged by Jesus' words. With our desire to show that we are holy, we might also give too much weight to rules without truly thinking about why the rules exist and the intention behind them. We are reminded in the Gospel, to not make ourselves holy by our actions, but rather let the Holy Spirit change us to become holy. Our actions should be an expression of the conversion of our heart to God and to God's ways.

ST JOHN THE BAPTIST-FEAST DAY 29th August

St. John the Baptist was a cousin of Jesus. His mother was St. Elizabeth and his father was Zechariah. Elizabeth was related to Mary and visited Elizabeth after the Angel Gabriel had told her that her cousin was also an expectant mother.



John preached a baptism of repentance, preparing people for the Messiah. He baptized Jesus in the Jordan River and watched with quiet joy as the Lord's public ministry began. John encouraged his own disciples to follow Jesus. He knew that Jesus' fame would grow, while his would fade away.

In the first chapter of the Gospel of John, St. John the Baptist calls himself a voice crying in the desert to make straight the path of the Lord. He invited people to get ready, to prepare themselves to recognize the Messiah. His message is the same to each of us today.

King Herod and his wife refused to obey God. They wanted to make their own rules for their lives. So St. John the Baptist told them what they were doing was wrong. Because he was honest and would not agree to do wrong, it made Herod's wife angry and she asked her husband for the head of John the Baptist.

Yet John would have had it no other way. He would not remain silent while sin and injustice were happening. He asked people to be sorry for their sins, obey God and be His friend as true happiness comes only from God.

Uniform

When my son was in Yr 5, he attended a Boys' College. A Brother pulled him off the school bus in the afternoon because his top button was undone - against uniform rules. The 10 year old had to find his own way home. This is not atypical of many schools. However, I DO NOT condone this sort of treatment

This week we conducted a 'uniform inspection' something we have never done before and something that may appear somewhat 'militant'. Regardless, Mrs Hey and I were very pleased with Monday's results with very few issues, these mostly being around girls' head wear. A reminder that there are the head bands or scrunchies provided with the uniform or PLAIN navy, teal or white ribbon/band. A reminder that the correct school shoes are black leather/leatherlike lace-ups, NOT BLACK JOGGERS.

Tuesday was the sports uniform check and the main issue, with around 40% of the students is the footwear. This has always been stipulated as white or predominantly so with some blue. The fluro that many students are wearing is not appropriate. I appreciate the expense involved and only ask that, when the time comes for a new pair of joggers for your child, that you purchase the ones suitable to be worn for school.

We will be following up later in the term. Thanks for your understanding and cooperation.

NUT AWARENESS

Upon enrolment, it is stipulated that OLA is a 'NUT AWARE' school and, as there are numerous students with serious nut allergies, parents are asked to avoid sending any food to school containing nuts. It has become apparent that some students are having NUT BARS/ MUESLI with nuts to eat as a snack. Please be considerate of others and provide some alternative snack for your children.

Once again a parent has come forward voicing concerns over the potential dangers in our car park, especially on Fridays after assembly. While I think we do a great job in clearing so much traffic in a short space, I understand these concerns. The main issue is small children weaving in and out of cars. PLEASE HOLD YOUR CHILD'S HAND and keep them close. A small child at the front of a big 4WD cannot be seen by the driver!!!

There have also been a number of concerns about the parking outside the school. Please be mindful of the road rules and parking rules. Please do not park in 'no parking' or 'no stopping' zones. The council has been notified of the illegal parking. Remember that there is plenty of parking over at Bruce Purser Reserve or Centenary Oval and you will be able to get home quicker than trying to park at school.


