

Dear Parents,

Gospel Reflection

Sunday, 12 February 2017: Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time-Year A (Mt 5:20-22. 27-28. 33-34. 37)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Such was said to your ancestors; but I am speaking to you.

Jesus said to his disciples: I tell you, if your virtue goes no deeper than that of the scribes and <u>Pharisees</u>, you will never get into the kingdom of heaven.

'You have learnt how it was said to our ancestors: You must not kill; and if anyone does kill he must answer for it before the court. But I say this to you: anyone who is angry with his brother will answer for it before the court.

'You have learnt how it was said: You must not commit adultery. But I say this to you: if a man looks at a woman lustfully, he has already committed adultery with her in his heart.

'Again, you have learnt how it was said to our ancestors: You must not break your oath, but must fulfil your oaths to the Lord. But I say this to you: do not swear at all. All you need say is "Yes" if you mean yes, "No" if you mean no; anything more than this comes from the evil one.'



In Sunday's Gospel, Jesus demonstrates the crucial nature of interpretation. It is easy for us today to look at something like the Ten Commandments or the Beatitudes and dismiss them as irrelevant. Taken literally, they have fairly limited application to our modern lives. However, interpreted in a broader context and within the context of our own lives, such ancient codes of behaviour can take on new significance. Jesus points us towards the importance of looking beyond the surface and searching out the truth of such statements. Interpretation of scripture for our modern lives and additional living life to the fullest.



Absenteeism

Every day matters! The cumulative effect of absenteeism can have a significant impact on learning, social and emotional wellbeing.

If your child is absent	That equates to	Which is	And over their school life from Kinder to year 12 that is
1 day per fortnight	20 days a year	4 weeks a year	Almost 1 and a half years of school
1 day per week	40 days per year	8 weeks a year	Over 2 and a half years of school

This year there is a big push on school attendance or, more significantly, absenteeism. As a system of schools, CEDP has a goal of 88% attendance. Currently, our data system shows that OLA is at...92%! Well done! Our target is to keep it no lower than 90%. You can help by keeping in mind that holidays away should be within the school vacation period as much as possible.



Thank you to everyone who is observing the rules and requests to ensure a smooth flow of traffic. Some people are disregarding the no parking zones which start at the bin area right through to the bell tower. This is especially from 8.15am to 8.50am and 2.45pm to 3.30pm. While one or two cars 'don't matter', hypothetically if everyone did this there would be chaos. The same applies to the Parish Parking. Apparently a number of cars are parking in the bus zones outside the school. Please be warned that the council rangers patrol the area from time to time.

IN THE AFTERNOON DO NOT WAIT IN YOUR CAR AT THE ENTRANCE TO THE PICK UP ZONE AS THIS CAUSES UNNECESSARY CONGESTION.

Staggered pick-up times.

Because students inevitably arrive at the pickup zone at different times, PLEASE note the following advised pick up times. Here again are the times to pick up your child...

- 3pm: ONLY KINDERGARTEN CHILDREN WITH NO SIBLINGS
- 3.10pm: Students Yr 1-3 with no older siblings
- 3.25 pm: This is the preferred time for picking up of students who are in Years 4-6 and their younger siblings, eg a family who has a kinder, a yr 3 and a yr 6 child

All students must be picked up by 3.40pm. If you are running late, please phone the office to let us know and to avoid your child becoming distressed.

PARENT HELPERS???

Have you completed your Child Protection for Volunteers Training??

It has been heartening to see how many of our parents, grandparents, etc, have completed the Child Protection Training in anticipation of helping out at school. Whenever this is done, the school is notified by email and the names added go on a register to which we refer when someone wants to come into the school. The list is growing, thank you.

Skoolbag App

Our Skoolbag app is a way of informing you of upcoming events or cancellation due to the weather, results from carnivals and gala days, giving updates while students are on excursions and other important information about major events within the school.

We have a large portion of the school already using this app. If you do not have the app it is free to download. To install it, just search for our school name "Our Lady of the Angels Primary Rouse Hill" in either the Apple App Store, or Google Play Store.



There are many benefits to having this app on your device:

- You may select to receive notification for your child's grade only.
- Absentee notes can be completed on this app.
- Access to newsletters and news events linked directly to our school website.
- Instant notification when excursions are postponed, assemblies cancelled due to bad weather, delays during excursions and other important information.
- Online permission notes in the future.

If you already have this app, it is up to you to update your settings to receive the correct push notifications. To update this click the "More" button on the bottom right of the app, then "Setup Push Notifications". Turn on the Push categories that are applicable for you by tapping the on/off switch. You will receive alerts specific to the selected grade and all alerts sent as a whole school.

Literacy News

How to help your child with spelling:

- ✓ Children can learn to spell some words by sounding out each letter. Short, simple words are best to learn in the beginning. Encourage your children to write stories and to spell words using the sounds the letters make.
- ✓ Make a puzzle word by writing a word on paper and cutting the letters apart. Magnetic and felt letters can also be used for this activity. Mix the letters and have your children spell the word by putting the letters in order.

As our Kindergarten children began their primary school journey last week, they have already been exposed to number concepts both at home and now at school. Parents are often wondering how they can take opportunities at home as part of their normal routine to help their children develop numeracy skills. Here are some ideas that may help...

Helping Your Child with Counting.

One of the first experiences children have with numbers is 'counting'. Counting starts as learning a pattern of words, just like a nursery rhyme. As children's counting develops, they begin to relate words to a quantity or number of things.

How do children learn to count and use numbers?

Children learn the pattern of counting words by repetition. Initially, this pattern may have gaps where the child leaves out a number in a sequence, or the child may invent numbers. It is common to hear a child say 'twenty-ten' after 'twenty nine'.

However, remembering the words for each number in the correct order is only part of the process of counting. To 'count' children need to match saying the number of words with the correct number of 'things'.

Children should be given lots of opportunities to practise and explore counting groups as well as making groups.

Children also need to recognize and name numbers. (We call this a number triad!

What can you do at home?

- > Count with your child the number of buttons on a shirt.
- Encourage your child to count the number of pegs used to hang out the washing.
- > Count the number of steps in your home.
- Count the number of eggs in a carton, and again after some have been removed.
- > Count the number of times you and your child can throw a ball to each other without dropping it.
- > Read and talk about stories and rhymes that use number.
- Have your child count as far as he or she is able to and then encourage your child to join you while you continue counting.
- > Ask your child to start counting from a number other than one.
- Ask your child to tell you the number before or after a number. How old will you be next year? How old were you last year?
- > Ask your child to give you enough plates and cutlery and cups for each person when setting the table.
- Play games such as Dominoes, Snakes and Ladders, card games or board games involving a die with dot patterns.

More ideas will follow in ensuing newsletters to cater for children in upper grades.

From the Office....

Thank you to all parents for your patience during the first weeks of school. The office desk and phone is often at its busiest at this time of year and so we do appreciate your patience.

Just a few reminders:-

Notes/money for the Office - Each morning teachers will ask the children in their class if they have any notes or money. Teachers will keep any information they require and will send any other notes or money to the office via the class note bag. This system allows the office to receive notes and money without parents being required to actually come into the school. It also helps the children develop responsibility for passing on information. For those new to school life, if a note says, 'please return to the office' we mean for it to come through the notebag to the office. Thanks

<u>Change of Details</u> - It is <u>critical</u> that the school has up-to-date contact details for all students at all times. Please ensure that any phone, address or contact details that change are relayed to the office as a matter of urgency. It is most distressing for children and staff if we are unable to contact parents in the case of a child being ill or injured.

<u>Visiting the School</u> - A reminder that during school hours, <u>ALL</u> parents, visitors and classroom helpers <u>MUST</u> sign in at the front office and collect a Visitors Sticker and then sign out as they leave the school, even if it is at the end of the day.

<u>Late/Early Leavers</u> - If your child is late for school or needs to be collected early, you must attend the office and fill out the Late/Early Leavers Slip. If your child arrives at 8.50am or later, you need to come into the office to sign them in. If there is a need to pick up your child early, please **DO NOT CALL THE OFFICE** to ask that your child is ready for when you get here. They will be called only when a parent has arrived to collect them. This is in the interest of minimising work in what is already a very busy office and in reducing the amount of lost learning time for your child. It is also recommended that appointments are made out of school time, wherever possible.

<u>School Fees</u> - The CEO will be sending out the school fees today. A note was sent home yesterday explaining the fees for this year as the school based fees have been consolidated into three fees instead of seven. This information has also been placed on our website. If you have any queries, please do not hesitate to contact the office.

<u>Medication</u> - If your child needs medication at school, new medication forms will need to be completed and given to the office. Please see us if you need to discuss anything, or you need the forms. <u>No medication is to be kept in your child's school bag.</u>

Student's Birthday

As the grades are becoming larger, we ask that if you send a treat in for your child's birthday that you only send enough for his/her class (not the whole grade). Also if you are sending in ice blocks, you will need to drop them at the office at about $\underline{1.30pm}$ as we don't have enough room in our freezer to keep them frozen throughout the morning. Cupcakes can be left at the office in the morning.
