#### Dear Parents,

"Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God." 2Corinthians 5:20

This week we find ourselves in the season of Lent, a time of preparation for Easter, the most important event in the Liturgical calendar.

Tuesday was Shrove Tuesday also known as Pancake Day, the last day of Ordinary Time. Wednesday was Ash Wednesday which marks the beginning of Lent. The verse above is taken from the second reading of Ash Wednesday for



which the whole school attended Mass. The students received the ashes on their forehead to the words, '*Repent and believe in the Gospel*'. This is a sign of our commitment during Lent to renew ourselves in some way – primarily through **prayer**, **abstinence** and doing **good works**. t is a time to question how well do we act as ambassadors for Christ? What do others see in the way we act towards each other that says to them, 'This is what it means to be a member of the Catholic Church''. Lent is an opportunity to 'fine tune' that message and make sure that it is a good and loving message to others.

Also on Wednesday, they received Project Compassion boxes to take home. We have already heard some touching feedback of the students' responses. You are encouraged to ask them about these and have some discussion about the season of Lent, what it means to them and you. Project Compassion boxes are due back at the end of term.



Gathering as a school community in celebration of the Eucharist is a very special privilege. Fr Warren is asking for your prayers to St Joseph that the new church will be ready for the 25<sup>th</sup> March, the Feast of the Annunciation, when we are hoping to have our first Mass there.

It was unfortunate that the social gathering set for last Friday night had to be cancelled due to the wet weather. Nevertheless, there will be many opportunities to get to know each other throughout the year. A regular and valuable opportunity is when you attend Mass on the weekend – Saturday night or Sunday morning- especially after the 10am

Mass on Sunday when the parish holds a morning tea. This is a perfect time for your children to meet with their class mates and for you to get to know the other parents. What better way to socialise than after a celebration of the Eucharist.

### **Gospel Reflection**



Mark 1:12-15 Jesus is tempted in the desert by Satan.

In Mark's Gospel, the desert marks beginning of Jesus' battle with Satan; the ultimate test will be in Jesus' final hours on the cross. In a similar way, our Lenten observances are only a beginning, a preparation for and a reinforcement of our ongoing struggle to resist the temptations we face in our lives. During Lent, we are led by the Holy Spirit to remember the vows of Baptism in which we

promised to reject sin and to follow Jesus. Just as Jesus was ministered to by the angels, God also supports us in our struggle against sin and temptation. We succeed because Jesus conquered sin once and for all in his saving death on the cross.

### Saint of the Week: Saint John Joseph of the Cross



St. John Joseph of the Cross was born at Ischia, Naples in Italy on the feast of the Assumption. He was a young noble, but he dressed like a poor man to be as poor as Jesus had been. At the age of sixteen, John Joseph entered the Franciscan order so he could live a self-sacrificing life like Jesus. He cheerfully made many sacrifices, slept for just three hours a night and ate very plain food. John was so well known for holiness that his superiors put him in charge of establishing a new friary before he even became a priest.

Later when he was ordained a priest, Father John Joseph became the superior at Santa Lucia's in Naples where he spent most of his long life. He always insisted on doing the hardest work and gladly chose to do the duties that no one else wanted to do.

St. John Joseph had a very loving nature. But he did not try to be the center of attention. Instead of waiting for people to recognize his gifts and reach out to him, he would reach out to others. All the priests and brothers thought of him as a loving father. He greatly loved the Blessed Virgin Mary, and tried to help others love her too. This good priest loved God so much that even when he was sick, he kept on working. He had the gifts of prophecy (tell the future) and healing, and would swoon into ecstasies (see visions and be unaware of where he was); he was known to levitate (rise from the ground and float in the air) and bilocate (be in two places at the same time). St. John Joseph died on March 6, 1734, at the age of eighty. (*Sourced from Holy Spirit Interactive*)

We have three EMU (Extending Mathematical Understanding) specialist teachers – Mrs Giglio, Mrs Hey and Miss Fredericks. Miss Fredericks and Mrs Hey work with Year 1 students and Mrs Giglio works with children in primary grades who require support in Maths.

As part of the study of Japanese language and culture, OLA has acted as host for Japanese students over the past two years. While we no longer have Japanese study, the organisation has requested if we would again host this year. The details are:

Wed 22 July 2015: Group arrives at OLA, 3.30pm

Thurs 23 July– at school Fri 24 July– at school Sat 25 July: Free time with host families Sun 26 July: Group will visit church in Marsfield (10:00-14:00) host family drops at 9.30am and picks up at 2pm. Mon 27 July – at school Tue 28 July: at school and 3.30pm Farewell and depart.

It will be 6 nights homestay with 4 days integration at the school. There is a \$40 per night per child to the host family (twin share). That is \$80 a night \$480 total for hosting two students.

There is a minimum of two students per family and they must have their own room. The expectation is that they become part of your family, doing whatever is the norm from day to day. This includes preparing lunch and snack for them at school.

These students, aged 11/12, are from NANZAN Christian School and have been, from our experience, very well behaved and respectful.

### 2015 IMPLEMENTATION PLANS

Each year, schools are asked to nominate goals in the areas of Formation, Numeracy and Literacy. These goals arise out of the 'where to next' from the previous year's reflection. This informs the teachers' professional learning throughout the year.

For your information, this year's goals are:

**Formation:** To help students become an intentional disciple and have a deeper knowledge of the Catholic faith through an enriched RE pedagogy (using the 3 levels of understanding).

**Literacy:** To further demonstrate Reading Comprehension though written response to text **Numeracy**: For every child to improve one Growth Point in Space and Measurement.

#### Parent Sacred Space.

### APPLICATION FOR EXEMPTION FROM ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL (10 school days or more)

Schools in the Parramatta Diocese have been informed that when families request to take their child/ren out of school for <u>10 days of more</u> during the term, it is necessary for them now to complete an <u>Application for</u> <u>Extended Leave</u> form (PRIOR to taking your child out of school). This form can be downloaded from the school website. On completion, the form is to be sent to the school office so that a Certificate of Exemption can be issued to parents.

Parents are advised that when this certificate is issued they will need to have this with them during the period of exemption that has been granted. This certificate is a legal document. All applications for leave must be sent to the office 2 weeks prior to departure.
