The Birth of John the Baptist - Feast Day: 24th June



John's parents were Elizabeth the cousin of the Blessed Virgin Mary and Zachary a temple priest whose job was to burn incense. Zachary and Elizabeth were quite old when one day an angel of God appeared to Zachary in the temple. The angel told him that his wife would bear a son who would be filled with the Holy Spirit at his birth. The child should be named John. Zachary found this difficult to believe and God punished him by taking away his voice. He remained dumb until after John's birth. Eight days after John was born his parents took him to the temple where he would be named Zachary, after his father. But both Elizabeth and Zachary asked for the child to be named John. Immediately, Zachary's tongue was loosened and got back his voice. John had a special job to do for God. He was going to prepare the way for the coming of Jesus. So when he was still young, about twenty-seven,

he went into the desert to prepare himself with silence, prayer and penance. He wore a tunic of camel hair with a leather belt and lived on wild honey and locusts (the locust tree is an evergreen that has edible bean like pods). Soon crowds started to come to him. They realized he was a holy man. He warned them to be sorry for their sins and asked them to change their lives. He baptized them with water and gave them the baptism of repentance. One day, Jesus himself came to John. He wanted to be baptized with John's baptism to begin making up for our sins. On that day, John told the crowds that Jesus was the Messiah, the one they had been waiting for. He told them and everyone else to follow him. Later on, St. John learned that King Herod had married Herodias a woman who already had a husband and a daughter. This king was the son of the King Herod who had murdered all those little boys in Bethlehem. St. John told him that it was wrong for him to live with that woman. King Herod was angry and humiliated. He locked John up in prison and John remained in a dark, damp dungeon for a long time. Then on Herod's birthday Herodias's daughter danced beautifully at his banquet. The delighted Herod said he would grant her any she wished. At her mother's request, she asked for the head of John the Baptist on a platter. The shocked Herod had no choice and sent his executioner to kill John and bring back his head. When his disciples heard about it, they immediately came and took his body and laid it in a tomb. Jesus said, "I am the Truth" and John died for the truth. St. John's motto was, "Jesus must become more and more. I must become less and less." He said that he was not even worthy to loosen the strap of Jesus' sandal.



Gospel Reflection Mark 4: 35-41

On that day, as evening drew on, Jesus said to his disciples: "Let us cross to the other side." Leaving the crowd, they took Jesus with them in the boat just as he was. And other boats were with him. A violent squall came up and waves were breaking over the boat, so that it was already filling up. Jesus was in the stern, asleep on a cushion. They woke him and said to him, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" He woke up, rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, "Quiet! Be still!" The wind ceased and there was great calm. Then he asked them, "Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?" They were filled with great awe and said to one another, "Who then is this whom even wind and sea obey?"

Worries and concerns are part of human life. Jesus teaches us, however, that we ought not to let worries and concerns consume us. Jesus teaches us that our faith ought to lead us to trust in God's protection and love, no matter how strong the whirlwind going on around us. Like the disciples, we can bring our worries and concerns to Jesus in prayer. Jesus will hear our cries for help. He knows that our faith can be fragile and he will act so that our trust in God will be strengthened. As you gather as a family, invite each family member to talk about something that might be worrying them. Talk about how important it is to share worries and concerns with other people. When we do this, we learn to see our worries from a different perspective. Read this week's Gospel, Mark 4:35-41. Ask your family questions such as these: Why were the disciples worried about the storm? Why wasn't Jesus worried about the storm? When we bring our worries to Jesus in prayer, Jesus can help us see things from God's perspective. Invite family members to name again a worry or concern and pray together that Jesus will help us have faith in God's love and protection. Conclude in prayer together by praying the Lord's Prayer.

OLA Uniform

PLEASE CHECK THAT YOUR CHILD'S ITEMS OF CLOTHING AND THAT THEY, INDEED BELONG TO YOUR CHILD.

I received the following from an irate parent and have permission to share. Having been there myself, I understand the frustration...

I write asking if you could include something in either the school newsletter about parents checking their child's jumpers/sport jackets to make sure they have the correct one.

(Child's) labelled sports jacket was finally returned to her this week after being missing for a month. Yes, a month, which frankly is unacceptable. Her labelled jumper has now been missing for a week. I am aware that children take home the wrong item of clothing on occasion, even more so in the lower school so the onus is on parents to check. I know people are busy but even if you had 6 kids it would take a minute to check all the labels matched their names. I find it hard to imagine many scenarios where a parent can't spare a few seconds to check and tell their child to put the wrong one in lost property or hand it to their teacher.

I am getting fed up with having to try to console (child) as she has been so worried that she will get in trouble for wearing a sports jacket on formal days which isn't fair when her items are labelled and she assures me she has put them in the right place or by her bag.

These uniform items are expensive and I am getting fed up with having to keep replacing labelled items that other parents deem to be acceptable to keep.

I appreciate the school can't make the slack parents pick up their game and become less selfish but I would appreciate it if a reminder about labelling clothing and checking that items you have are your child's could be issued.

Upon enrolment of your child at OLA, the expectations around the wearing of uniform is made very clear. 

Complimenti bravissimo

There are some issues being reported around the school and some children are becoming upset about the unhealthy play/reference to the spiritual world. You might know it as 'charlie/charlie'. This sort of thing has been around forever and it is a matter of handling it sensitively and firmly. It is not a local issue and below is a very useful article from last week's catholic weekly for your reference.

Charlie's boring, God isn't

Don't panic if your child has been involved in the latest social media fad known as 'Charlie, Charlie', writes Dr Greg Popcak, but take it seriously – and see it as a teaching moment to unveil some of the wonder of the Catholic faith ...

IT SEEMS to have come out of nowhere and gone viral in an instant. There is a new "game" sweeping through youth via the pervasive social media. It's called "The Charlie Challenge". Superficially, it seems like a silly, harmless, childish fantasy. Kids make a grid on a piece of paper that says, "yes/no". They make an X out of two pencils and attempt to summon an erstwhile demon named "Charlie". Then they ask him questions which he answers by moving the pencils. It's rather creepy to watch.

Of course, it all sounds like silly nonsense, except that it isn't and – in the mind of a middle school child – this game can be played for rather high stakes. Remember the two schoolgirls who attempted to murder their friend to appease "Slenderman"?

Sometimes child's play isn't just stuff and fluff.

That said, my concern is primarily what to tell your kids about it. Here are some suggestions.

Satan is boring

A lot of people who don't know better are fascinated by Satan. But here's the thing, Satan is boring. Jesus Christ rose from the dead. Satan moves pencils around. What's so exciting about that? People who are fascinated by this nonsense are, simply put, foolish and stupid. Don't be foolish and stupid. Christians have better things to do. We worship the God who kicked Satan's butt. Don't waste time with losers.

Stupid and foolish is still harmful

Just because something is foolish and stupid doesn't mean it isn't dangerous. Drugs and alcohol are stupid and foolish. High risk sexual behavior is stupid and foolish. Texting and driving is stupid and foolish. But each year these lesser demons claim thousands upon thousands of lives. Playing with "Charlie" is stupid and foolish, too, because it purports to turn evil into

a playmate. When we choose to associate with even the glamour of evil, we take our eyes off of God. That's like turning off the lights before walking through a room filled with booby-traps and alligators just for the fun of it. We need to keep our eyes on the Lord at all times because he is our only reliable source of guidance and grace. The so-called "Charlie Challenge" is a silly distraction that isn't worth taking a single second away from the God who loves us more than anything and sacrificed everything to spend eternity with us. God has given us much better than this and he deserves better than this from us.

It is a serious sin

sin and a violation of the First Commandment (Have no other gods but me). It represents idolatry and divination. Here is what the Catechism has to say on these sins ...

Divination and magic

2115 God can reveal the future to his prophets or to other saints. Still, a sound Christian attitude consists in putting oneself confidently into the hands of Providence for whatever concerns the future, and giving up all unhealthy curiosity about it. Improvidence, however, can constitute a lack of responsibility.

2116 All forms of divination are to be rejected: recourse to Satan or demons, conjuring up the dead or other practices falsely supposed to "unveil" the future. Consulting horoscopes, astrology, palm reading, interpretation of omens and lots, the phenomena of clairvoyance, and recourse to mediums all conceal a desire for power over time, history, and, in the last analysis, other human beings, as well as a wish to conciliate hidden powers. They contradict the honor, respect, and loving fear that we owe to God alone.

2117 All practices of magic or sorcery, by which one attempts to tame occult powers, so as to place

temptation – even over a silly game – can change our entire spiritual perspective. Instead of seeing ourselves as God's disciples, we begin to see prayer, the sacraments, and sacramentals as talismans that give us power over the world. This is the antithesis of the receptive spirit required of a disciple of the Lord and Satan knows it. Anyone who dabbles in these kinds of activities will need to confess this prideful spiritual attitude to reorient themselves to a proper mindset for discipleship in which we learn the way of life by listening to God, not by trying to claim spiritual power over life by illicit means.

Don't freak out

If your child plays this game or has played this game you will need to treat him or her with gentleness, love, and affection. Not with anger, outrage, and anxiety. Talk to your child as if you were talking to someone who had no idea what he or she was doing and still may not understand what has happened. Most likely your child was acting in naivete and ignorance. He or

she will need to be taught, not only why this was a poor and even sinful choice, but what to do instead. Your child's playing of this game represents a distortion of the natural and godly desire to know God's will and understand God's plan for their lives. If you have not taught your child how to have a meaningful personal prayer life or discern God's will, you will need to do so – or learn to do so – over the next several weeks together. Simply punishing your child without teaching your child how to bring his or her concerns to God and hear his voice is simply setting your child up for future occult involvement.

Using your own words, gently and patiently explain to your child the things that I have shared with you in points 1-4 above. Then take your child to Confession. Let your child know how much you love them and want to help him or her learn how to turn to God to get the answers for the deepest questions of his or her heart.

See the hidden opportunity

The Charlie Challenge is not something to lose sleep over, but it is something to take seriously. Most importantly, it is an opportunity to teach your child to have the heart of a disciple who knows how to seek God's will and hear God's voice so that he or she isn't tempted to seek counsel from more dubious and diabolical sources.

them at one's service and have a supernatural power over others – even if this were for the sake of restoring their health – are gravely contrary to the virtue of religion.

In short, "The Charlie Challenge" is idolatry because it is attempting to ascribe godlike power (e.g. secret knowledge and knowledge of the future) to something that is not God.

It is divination because rather than praying to God about their concerns this game has children asking a pair of pencils what the future holds. Who is it better to give the care of the future to? Lord God King of the Universe? Or a couple of pencils that, most days, can't even manage to help a kid fill in the right circles on a standardized test?

Go to Confession.

If your child plays this game or has played this game, it will be important to go to confession immediately. Letting the devil in the door, even for silly reasons, is never something to take lightly. It is true that Christ has the victory and Satan has no power over God's children – unless, that is, we invite him in. It doesn't have to be a formal invitation. Playing a silly game is enough. The idea that we can wield power over spirits is a tempting thought but giving into that
